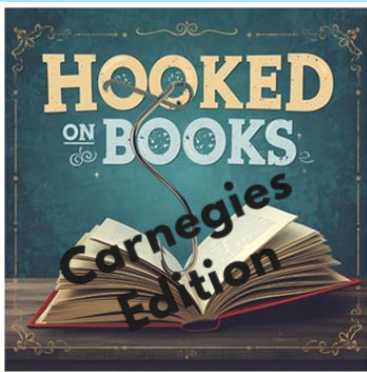

## Fidget Toys

Fidget items can be a valuable tool to support focus and self-regulation in school when used appropriately. **These are tools, not toys, and their use must be agreed in advance with Miss Daw (Disadvantaged Lead) and Miss Curtis (SENDCo).** When used correctly, fidget items can help pupils maintain attention. However, if misused, they may become a distraction to others.

To ensure consistency, we are currently allowing the use of fidget stones and fidget tangles, as these are silent, discreet, and easy to manage within the classroom environment to students where this has been identified as a suitable and effective strategy.

Once permission has been granted, these items can be conveniently purchased via ParentPay.

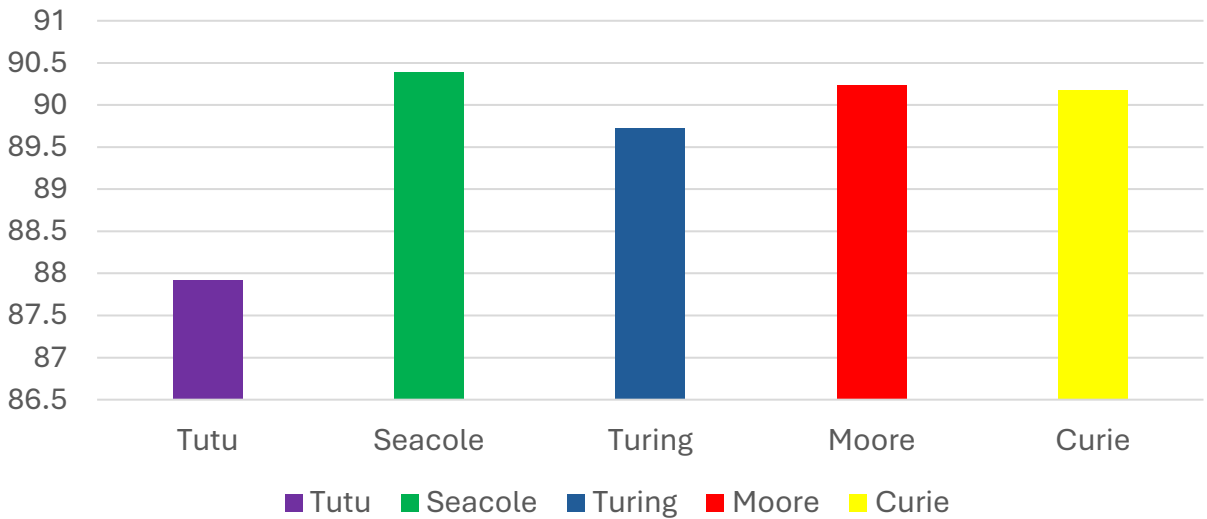

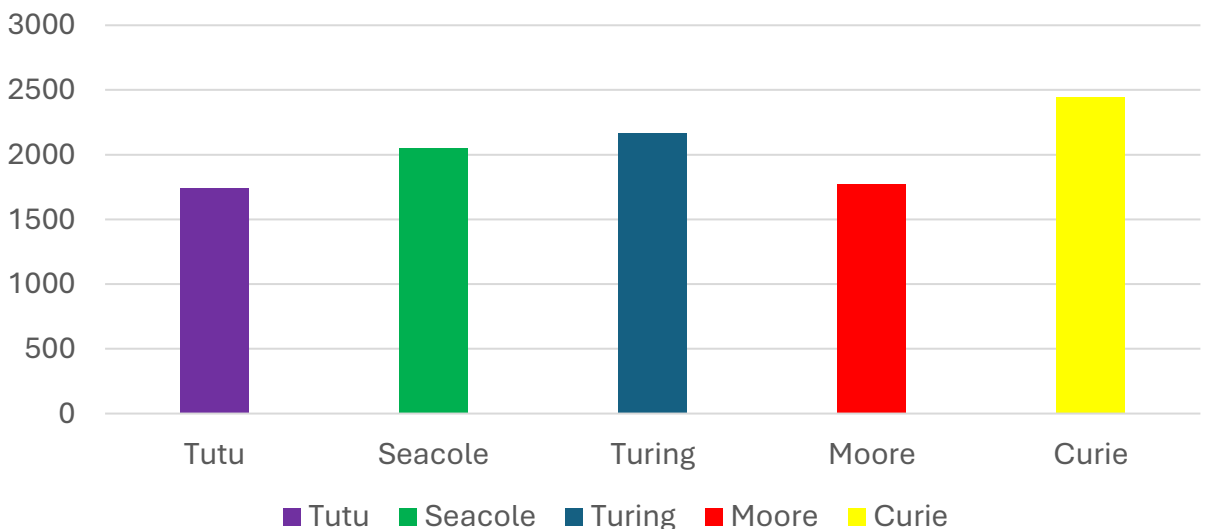



# Spotlight on Sixth Form



## Brickwork Level 1

Ewan joined UAH Sixth Form from our sister school, UALS, to begin his City & Guilds Level 1 Brickwork course.

This 1-year introductory course is designed for aspiring bricklayers and provides a strong foundation in both practical skills and theoretical knowledge. The programme covers essential areas, such as basic block and bricklaying, cavity wall construction, setting out and site safety. It prepares learners for progression to Level 2 or entry into an Apprenticeship.

Ewan said *“I chose Engineering and Construction as my options and really enjoyed it. I receive all the support I need here, and my tutors are amazing. I am really happy at UAH – we get a lot of hands-on experience, and everyone works together and supports one another”*.

Ewan is planning on progressing onto Level 2 in September and ultimately secure on-site employment upon completion of his course.

# Department News – Joinery

## Bird Box Competition

Level 1 Joinery students took part in the annual Bird Box Competition this week.

Learners were challenged to construct a fully functional bird box under the following conditions:

- The bird box had to be built using no screws, nails or fixings – only traditional joinery techniques.
- It needed to be designed so it could be opened and cleaned at the end of the nesting season.
- Students were required to develop a secure method for attaching the bird box to a tree or wall.

This project provided an excellent opportunity for students to enhance their understanding of historical joinery methods, whilst also developing confidence in using modern workshop machinery.

Entries were judged by the Head of Department, with Jack Munton's design being awarded first place for its precision, craftsmanship, and high-quality finish. However, all students performed exceptionally well, producing a range of beautifully constructed pieces.

Each learner got to take their completed bird box home, with many of them choosing to gift them for Mother's Day – a thoughtful gesture with the added benefit of supporting local wildlife.

# Spotlight on Sixth Form



## T-Level Health

Ellouise previously attended UAH, where she selected Health and Social Care as one of her Year 10 options and successfully achieved a Level 2 qualification by the end of Year 11.

She is interested in progressing to a Degree Apprenticeship, with a particular interest in Midwifery, although she remains open to considering a range of alternative career pathways.

Ellouise is currently completing a placement at Holbeach Hospital and is also employed there as a Bank Carer. This role is enabling her to gain valuable hands-on experience within a real healthcare environment.

The course is a two-year, full-time programme that covers core units such as Human Lifespan Development, Working in Health and Social Care, Anatomy and Physiology, Meeting Individual Care and Support Needs, and Principles of Safe Practice.

Assessment is delivered through a combination of externally assessed examinations and tasks, alongside internally assessed coursework, supplemented by practical work experience in a health or social care setting.

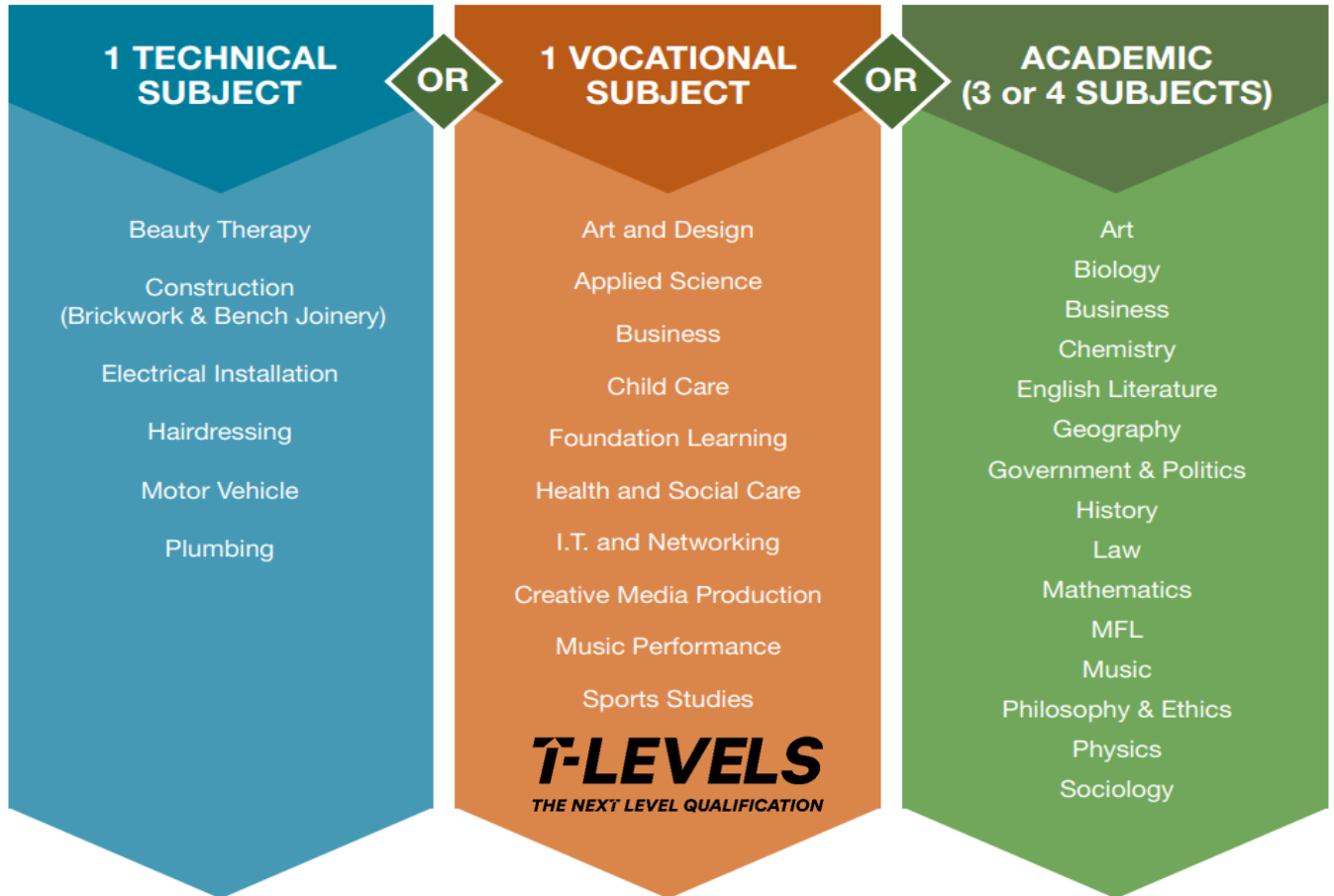
