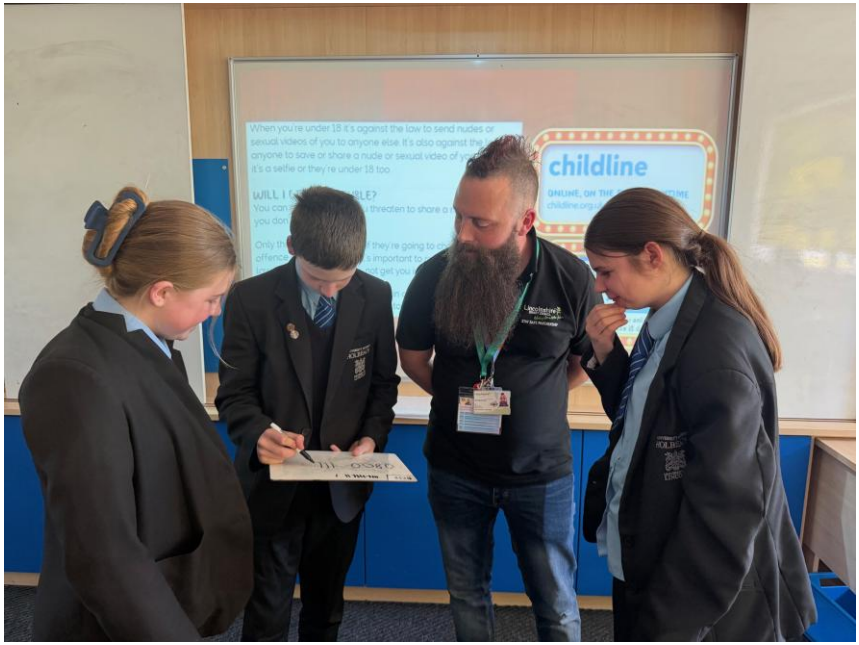

# Uniform Policy



As we enter the warmer months of the Summer Term, we understand that some adjustments to the school uniform may be needed to help pupils stay comfortable. However, we are also committed to maintaining high standards, and all pupils are expected to follow the uniform policy. Any breaches will be addressed in line with our usual procedures.

**Please note the following uniform expectations and adjustments for the Summer Term:**

## Blazers

Blazers may be removed during the Summer Term, from Friday 1 May 2026; however, outdoor jackets and coats must not replace the blazer. If a pupil does feel that they need to wear an additional layer of clothing, blazers must always be worn before any outdoor jacket/coat.

Uniform options within school, during the Summer Term: a shirt and tie; a shirt, tie, and jumper; a shirt, tie, and blazer; or all four items (shirt, tie, jumper, and blazer). Shirts must be tucked in, and ties should be worn at a reasonable length.

## Outdoor jackets and coats

Outdoor jackets and coats cannot replace blazers. If a pupil feels cold, they should wear their blazer before adding an outdoor jacket or coat. Only warm, school appropriate jackets and coats are allowed. Hoodies, sports tops, fleece jackets, gilets or tracksuit tops are not permitted as an outdoor jacket or coat. **These items will be confiscated if worn.**

## Arrival at school

Upon arrival at school, all pupils must be wearing the correct uniform items. The school will check pupils' uniform at the entrance to ensure compliance. Trainers, hoodies, leggings, and other non-uniform items such as short skirts and facial piercings (including retainers) are not permitted.

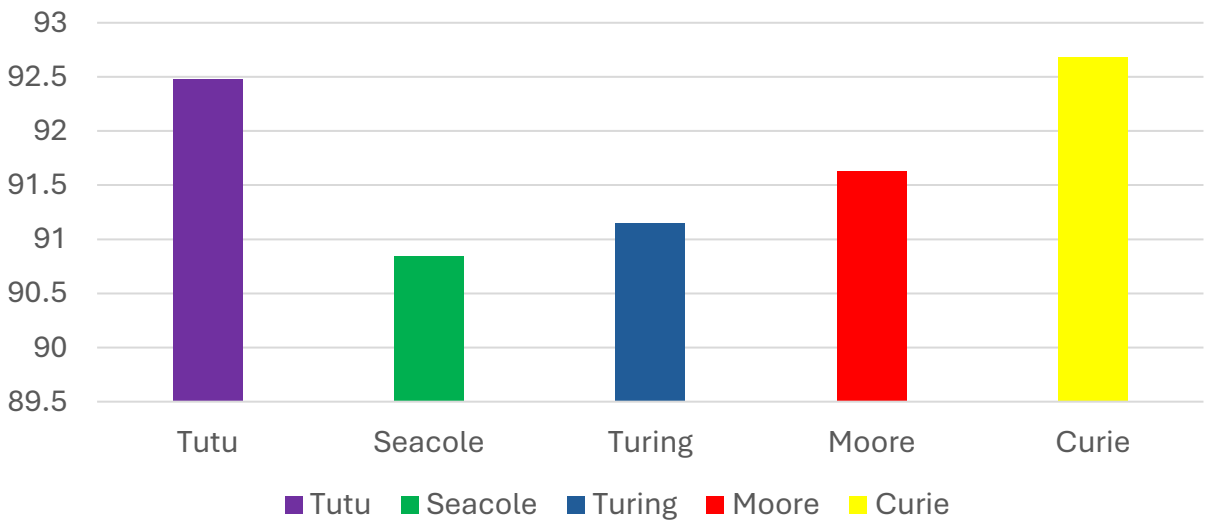

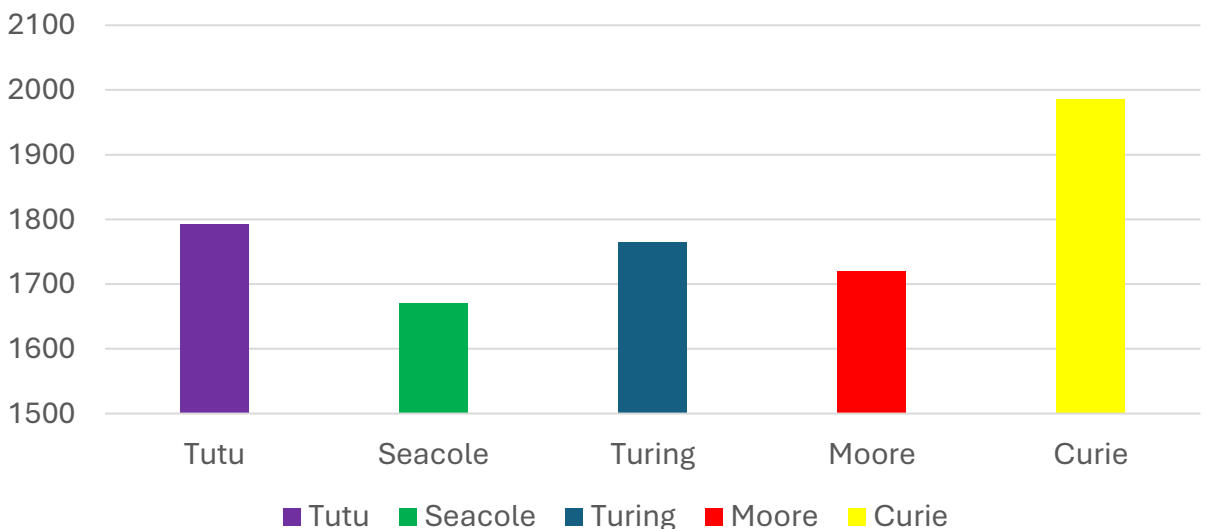


It's also completely normal to feel some stress at this time, so **take care of yourself**: get enough sleep, eat well, and talk to someone if you're feeling overwhelmed.

# Department News – Sixth Form

This week Year 12 this week have been working on creating a CV during their tutor times getting them ready for applying to roles outside of education, looking at how to showcase you skills and talents and grabbing the attention of an employer.

Many Year 13 students have either started or are about to start their assessments and/or exams, so they have been looking at 'brain food' the importance of and how to look after yourself.

An exciting opportunity for L3 Health Care Students:

Healthcare Level 3 students had the opportunity to attend The Queen Elizabeth Hospital in King's Lynn over a three-day placement.

The aim of the visit was to give students a valuable insight into working within a healthcare setting.

Throughout the three days, students took part in a wide range of engaging and practical activities. These included a pharmacy tour, where they learned how the pharmacy operates, along with the functions and logistics involved in safely supplying medication. They also toured a working ward, giving them the opportunity to observe how staff interact with and care for patients on a day-to-day basis.

Students explored the role of the healthcare support worker, developing an understanding of the skills and responsibilities required for the role. They covered infection control and participated in an interactive ward management activity, where they were tasked with staffing a 33-bed ward. This involved deciding how many staff were needed and justifying their choices.

Further learning included pressure sores and moisture lesions—how these develop, how they are treated, and who concerns should be reported to.

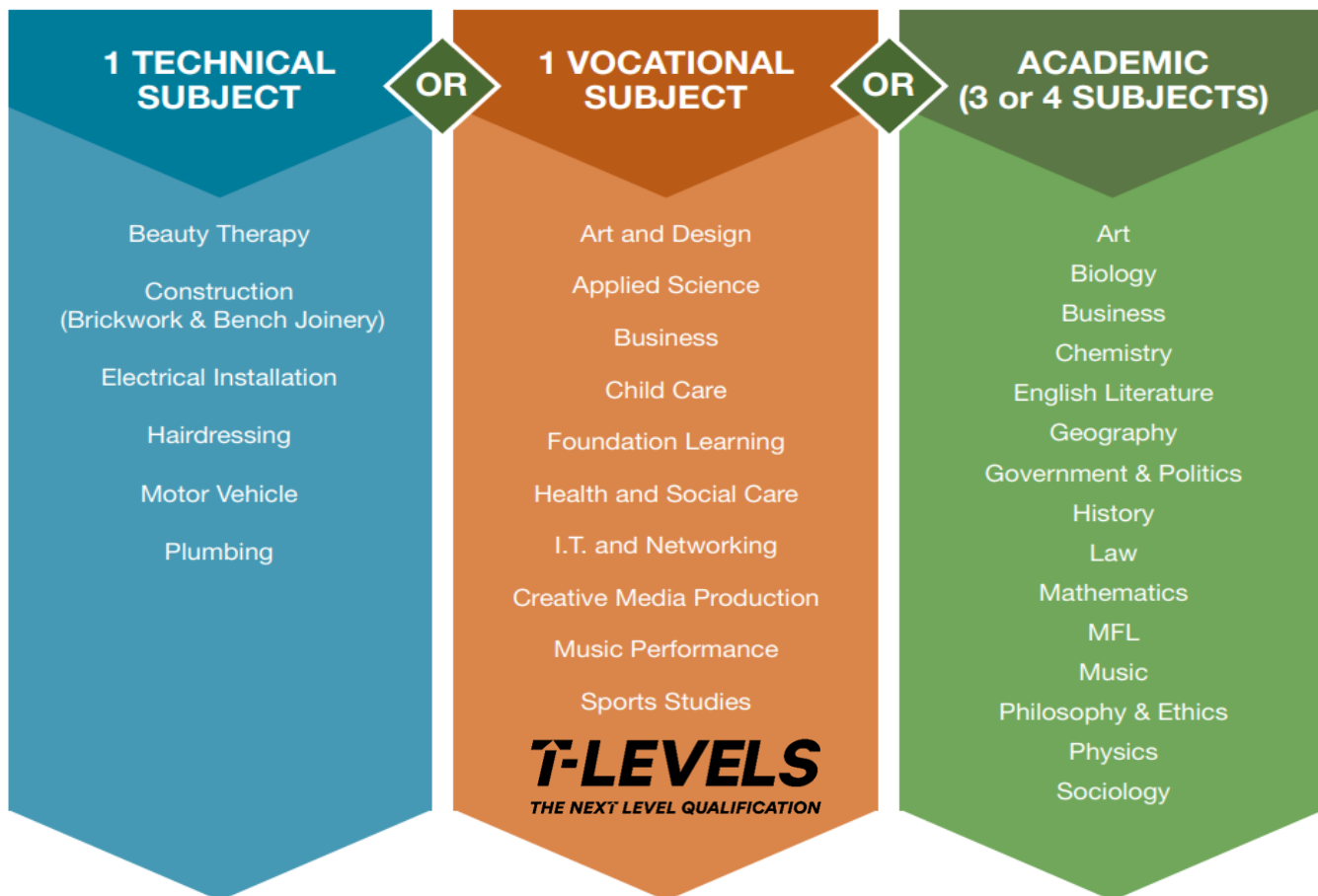
Safeguarding was also covered, focusing on why safeguarding matters must be reported and escalated appropriately. Students then took part in a health-themed escape room, followed by team-building and communication activities.

On the final day, students worked in a simulation ward. They completed patient observations required on admission and reported their findings to the nurse or ward manager on duty. The experience concluded with careers and interview skills, where students were interviewed by nurses and received constructive feedback.

Overall, it was a brilliant three days filled with hands-on experiences, learning opportunities, and lasting memories that students will take away with them as they continue their journey into healthcare.

### Key Information

Today, a member of the Stay Safe Partnership, delivered a Healthy Relationship workshop to Year 7/Year 8.

The workshop covers qualities of a healthy relationship, domestic abuse and identifying controlling behaviors.

### Learning Objectives

- To understand what makes a healthy relationship
- To understand the term Domestic Abuse
- To understand controlling/coercive behavior
- How to, and where to find help and support.

### Key Messages

**Domestic abuse** is any incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive or threatening behaviour, violence or abuse between those aged 16 or over, who are or have been personally connected.

Examples of Coercive Control:



Walking on and eggshells, threatening.

Name calling

**Healthy Relationship Traits:**



**Love Bombing:** giving someone excessive compliments, attention, or affection to eventually control them.

**Gaslighting:** causing someone to question their sanity, memories, or perception of reality.

### Importance of the Session



23% of young people exposed to domestic abuse are also demonstrating harmful behaviour themselves.



1 in 5

41%

20% of children live with an adult perpetrating domestic abuse.

43% of young girls have experienced some form of sexual violence.

47% of young people exposed to domestic abuse are being directly harmed by the family member.



72%

49%

72% of girls and 51% of boys had experienced emotional violence.

49% of boys thought hitting a partner would be 'okay' - Safe Lives (2017).

**Freedom of Speech** = [Article 10](#) protects the right to hold your own opinions and express them freely without government interference. We hold duties and responsibilities to behave respectfully towards others
